

Because of their compassion and commitment to this vision, over \$252,000 has been raised and 1,011,792 meals have been packaged and shipped to feed hungry children all over the world!

On Sunday, February 5, a special Fish Appeal will be taken to raise money for the Stop Hunger Now meal packaging event on Sunday, March 5, where 151,000 meals will be packaged. Each meal costs 29 cents, adding up to \$43,790.00. Church of the Servant has raised this and more each year. Tarah began bringing Cancer Care Packs to treatment, and praying with patients over her sixteen months of chemotherapy. Care Packs contained simple things Tarah used to fight cancer and as she distributed them she was able to share her joy and hope in Christ. We will be decorating bags and writing cards to cancer fighters.

PROFILE OF FAITHFULNESS

Michelle Knight's love of God shines brightly through music. "Music notes, both vocal and instrumental, enhance words or lyrics," says Michelle. Michelle believes that many people connect with music even when they are not able to connect with anything else. Music is a universal language.

Michelle sees music as a spiritual experience and her ministry: "Music is where I feel closest to my Savior. I have memorized much scripture because I sing it. My prayer every time I sing is, 'Please, Lord, let someone feel closer to you in this song. Please help them to feel wrapped up in your love and peace.' I also ask him to calm my nerves. If just one person can feel God's love through song, that is what it's all about."



Michelle has shared her talent and love of music at Servant for almost twenty years. Michelle reflected on her years in Music Ministry: "I was actually a member of the choir off and on for a few years when I was a young adult.

Since I had babies and worked full time, it was difficult for me to consistently make it to Wednesday night rehearsals. I sang in the choir with Larry and a little with Michael. I also was asked to sing solos occasionally and I sang in a group called 'All-in-All'. And then, a few years ago, my good friend, Jennifer Robinson, invited me to become a part of choir."

Michelle said that she honestly cannot imagine her life without music. She calls it "my escape, my therapy, my relief." She is very grateful for the amazing leadership of Chuck Weatherford, Matt Schinske, and Rachel Mitchell. Michelle says she looks forward to Wednesdays and Sundays so she can visit and "make music with some amazing people! I love my choir family dearly."

What is Inductive Bible Study? God's Word is your guidebook for all of life, and inductive study gives you the key to understanding that guide. Inductive study, a method that brings you directly to the Word of God apart from another's understanding or interpretation of the text, involves three skills: (1) Observation teaches you to see precisely what the passage says. It is the basis for accurate interpretation and correct application. Observation answers the question: What does the passage say? (2) Interpretation answers the question: What does the passage mean? (3) Application answers the question: What truths can I put into practice, and what changes should I make in my life? When you know what God says, what He means, and how to put His truths into practice, you will be equipped for every circumstance of life. Ultimately, the goal of personal Bible study is a transformed life and a deep and abiding relationship with Jesus Christ.

Prime Time will welcome Dr. Bob Blackburn, notably called the “face of Oklahoma history.” Dr. Blackburn is a native Oklahoman who earned his Ph.D. from Oklahoma State University, and has been executive director of the Oklahoma Historical Society since 1999.

He has authored 18 books on Oklahoma history, delivered well over a thousand lectures, and appears frequently on television. He helped spearhead the effort to fund and construct the Oklahoma History Center, a Smithsonian-quality museum and research facility that opened on statehood day, November 16, 2005.

Dr. Blackburn has spent almost four decades championing Oklahoma’s history, and is the guiding force behind the historical society’s transformation into a powerful, vital organization that pushes constantly for excellence.




